Citizens of Exceptional Achievement Award ~ Spirit of Thunder Bay Award

This special award recognizes an individual who has volunteered time toward improving and enriching the community of Thunder Bay. This is an individual who has shown extraordinary leadership, innovation and meaningful voluntary contributions and has a minimum of 15 years of cumulative volunteer experience in Thunder Bay.

This year the award was presented to our very own Thunder Bay & District Master Gardener Lynda Lahteenmaa who was nominated by the Thunder Bay Art Gallery. An MG for over 20 years and a certified Horticultural Therapist, Lynda firmly believes that 'gardening goes beyond cultivation of the soil'. It is a pursuit that promotes wellness, creativity, and joy. Through her many presentations and Horticultural Therapy activities in the community, Lynda shares these enduring values.

Thunder Bay Art Gallery has long collaborated with the Thunder Bay & District Master Gardeners on the Annual Art Gallery Garden Tour. As an MG, Lynda has been an integral part of that collaboration. For 15 years she has volunteered her time and has encouraged dozens of gardeners in our community to find joy in opening their gardens to the public. Utilizing her 20 years' experience as a MG, Lynda has presented at teaching sessions at the Home and Garden Show, Seedy Saturday gatherings, our Look, Listen & Learn sessions and other events.

Lynda's gardening passion lead her to the study of Horticultural Therapy (HT) – a formal practice that uses plants, horticultural activities and the garden landscape to promote wellbeing for participants. Working with management and staff at Hogarth Riverview Manor (HRM), Lynda established a Horticultural Therapy Program for residents living with dementia. Her gentle leadership has also guided the creation of a significant outdoor garden that brings sensory joys into the lives of residents and their families.

Lynda has done much to raise awareness of Horticultural Therapy and pursued HT certification before its positive benefits were widely recognized, encouraging people to move forward with the idea and inspiring volunteers.

A decade later she continues to help facilitate monthly HT sessions at HRM with other Master Gardeners, and the program has become a model for other organizations who support individuals living with dementia. Perhaps Lynda's contribution lies in her approach to volunteerism.

She is always learning, growing personally and offering advice with humility. Lynda deserves to be recognized for her willingness to share her gardening knowledge and passion in our community.

Name: A COVID-19 Safe Fall Bulb Sale

Details: PEC MGs lost our two key fundraising activities (May Plant Sale and a 4 week-end consumer consulting contract with a local Your Independent Grocer) this year over health concerns. At the same time, we have 8 MGITs in our small chapter of 21 members. As we subsidize tuition expenses and pay for MGOI fees, this put a strain on finances. Undaunted, MGIT Gail Walker found a COVID-19 safe solution by partnering with the Florissa Fundraising arm of Van Noort Bulbs of Langley B.C. to have a Spring Flowering Bulb Sale. Florissa provided us with a web page and full on-line services for our customers to order and pay for their bulbs. Customers had the option to pay for Canada Post delivery or to enjoy free delivery with local curbside pick-up.



Our members spread the word by reaching out to friends, family, neighbours and the general public using social media, email, phone calls and unpaid advertising on a local website. We quickly blew past our fundraising objective of \$1,500 to raise \$2,983 setting a sales record with Florissa!

A total of 99 supporters spent an average of \$27 and bought 467 packages of spring blooming bulbs. Our initiative with Prince Edward Fitness & Aquatic Centre made up the balance of the sales. Our bulk delivery arrived just after Thanksgiving and we offered 2 pick-up times in both Belleville and Picton. With no money to change hands, a brief outdoor contact quickly connected the bulbs to the gardeners. We are looking forward to greeting spring with a lot of beautiful blossoms in our region.

Details: On October 4th, the Long Branch Neighbourhood Association hosted a virtual version of its annual Tree Fest. EMG supported the event by scheduling a presentation on pruning trees and shrubs and two virtual advice clinics, all live on Zoom.

A small but engaged group joined in, raised some questions and listened while some of our members discussed several topics, including challenges and best practices.

As EMGs first virtual interaction with the community, this was a novel but interesting learning experience for all participants.



Durham Master Gardeners

Name: Oshawa City Hall Giving Gardens

Co-leads: Anne Van de Velde and Helen Vander Byl

Details: The Durham Master Gardeners, in partnership with The Oshawa Garden Club and the City of Oshawa, planted, cared for and harvested nine garden beds located at Oshawa City Hall. A true “Covid Project”, these beds were repurposed from flower beds to vegetable gardens with all of the produce donated to ‘Feed the Need Durham’, an organization that services 65 food banks in the Durham Region.

Durham MGs tended four of the garden beds and delivered a total of 372 pounds of fresh produce (kale, beets, parsnips, several varieties of squash, beans, spinach, onions, carrots, cabbage and peas) to ‘Feed the Need’ to support families experiencing food insecurity.

Some of the team’s favourite experiences were painting rocks with their children and neighbourhood kids to use as plant markers; engaging with passersby on the best ways to plant and harvest veggies; learning from each other; receiving 1,000 shares on Facebook;

making the front page of the local newspaper; and being featured on the CTV Toronto 6 pm news as “The Good News Story of the Day” and seeing our veggies across the nation on the CTV National news.

On October 5th we did a final cleanup of the beds and held a small project end celebration at which City of Oshawa officials presented us with certificates of appreciation recognizing our hard work and dedication to the project. This project allowed us to connect to our community in a very special way and helped fill a significant need, which was very rewarding.

Our biggest challenge meant replanting what wildlife either dug up or helped themselves to: in particular the squirrels and chipmunks fancied squash and bean plants!

We are hopeful that we will be invited to participate in this fantastic endeavour again next year.

Name: Mentoring at Its Finest ~ Nurturing Life Through Gardening

Details: The therapeutic benefits of plants, gardening, and nature-related experiences are becoming more clearly understood as more research on the benefits of horticultural therapy are explored. An increasing number of gardens are being created at health and human care centres more than ever.


Thunder Bay & District MGs are involved in creating some of these health promoting gardens. Rosemary McNabb and Andrea Steinhäusser, two of our MGITs under the mentorship of MG Lynda Lahtenmaa, have taken on a project for St. Joseph Heritage, Manor House. They are designing and creating a passive therapeutic landscape to offer a restorative place for Day Care Program clients, visiting family members, as well as staff and volunteers.

The Manor House offers a social and recreational day program for older adults who have Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. The goal is to design a garden that will meet the needs of the client. It has to be safe with accessible safety supportive features and non-toxic plantings both dermal and oral, with emphasis on their sensory qualities to stimulate senses, memory, conversation and activities. Old fashioned plants are ideal; they are familiar plants to which clients can respond and they offer positive reminiscences of their past gardens and gardening experiences and skills.


