International MG Conference The International Master Gardener Conference, which took place in Saskatoon from July 21 to 24 this year, was the first time I had attended such a conference and I hope it will not be the last. There must have been some 600 attendees from all over the U.S. and Canada, including about 20 from Ontario. The conference was full of "good vibes". David Tarrant and David Cavagnaro were the "star" speakers - both were stunningly informative, amusing and breathtaking (I'm talking about their pictures!). There were tours of all sorts; I favoured the science tour, which visited Canada's Light Source (Cyclotron). Both the gardens on tour and the city's planters were spectacular. The organization and hospitality of the Saskatchewan organizing group was outstanding. The next IMG meetings take place in Little Rock Arkansas in 2007 and in Las Vegas in 2009. Dare we hope that MGOI might be able to host an IMG conference in the future? Perhaps 2011 - I think we have a super site in Niagara but we would need an enormous fund-raising drive. Learning from MG-List

Last fall, on one of the MGlistsery discussion groups, Ron Rossini explained how he harvested tomatoes four to six weeks earlier than normal. His tip was to use a Kozy Koat, a plastic cover with tubes that can be filled with water. The sun warms the water. keeping the plants frost-free, even to -9°C. Lanark County MG Dale Odorizzi took note and placed Kozy Koats on her Christmas list. On May 7 of the following spring, she planted and protected a tomato plant, and cucumbers and cabbages too, with a Kozy Koat. On the morning of May 9, the water in the Kozy Koats froze solid, but the tomato plant grew happily. By the middle of July, Dale was overwhelmed with cucumbers. and while the tomatoes were not ripe yet, they were ahead of the others that she had planted later. The point of all of this is that the MG-listserv provides a lot of useful information, and usually someone can help to answer any question that you might have.

Of the 800 MGs in Ontario, 581 are missing out on this useful communications tool. An email exchange that helps you keep in touch with other MGs across the province, the MG listserv is free, as easy to use as email and exclusive to Ontario MGs.
