Remembering Tracy by Anne Brossart, Coordinator GBMGs

Tracy was the embodiment of the MGOI mission of "Motivating and Inspiring Gardeners in Ontario". She had a thirst for horticultural knowledge and boundless energy in her life for sharing it.

Tracy became a certified Master Gardener (Simcoe County) in 2011 and was a long-time member of the Alliston Garden Club (OHA) from 1999 until her death on December 25<sup>th</sup> 2024. She was an amazingly creative floral designer and accredited judge of all things horticultural: certified by the Ontario Horticultural Association, the Royal Botanical Gardens' Horticultural Judging School, the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies and the Canadian Rose Society. After qualifying as a Master Gardener, she carried on completing her University of Guelph Horticulture Certificate and honed her skills as a floral designer by completing the Toronto Botanical Garden's Floral Design Certificate. She often stated that everything she knew about botany, she had learned at judging school.

When Tracy and her husband Vaughan retired and moved to Parry Sound in 2017, she became a Georgian Bay Master Gardener and joined the Parry Sound & District Horticultural Society and the OHA District 18 Board, but remained a member of the Alliston Garden Club and OHA District 16's flower show committee. She organized and judged flower shows and conducted design workshops.

Just like a perennial is divided into two thriving plants, Tracy volunteered tirelessly in both communities and still found time for her annual spring roadside garbage ditch cleanup. Tracy will be sorely missed by the Georgian Bay Master Gardeners who will plant a Serviceberry (Amelanchier) in her memory. The Serviceberry's relationship with the natural world is an embodiment of reciprocity, interconnectedness, and gratitude.

The tree distributes its wealth—its abundance of sweet, juicy berries—to meet the needs of its natural community. That is how Tracy lived her gardening life, sharing her knowledge, time and even her plants generously.

# **Peterborough and Area Master Gardeners**

# Name: Community Seed Exchange Table at the Peterborough Public Library

**Details:** PMG Laura Gardner has an exciting program going on at the Peterborough Public Library (PPL) over the wintertime. It's a Community Seed Exchange table, a partnership between PPL and Nogojiwanong Mutual Aid. There you can pick up and leave seeds of all types. It is pretty empty right now because most people aren't growing anything. However, if you are into native perennials, you are probably getting ready to do some "winter sowing". Many native seeds need to be exposed to a period of cold-moist stratification – the conditions needed to break dormancy in the spring. If you're interested in learning about winter sowing, the Ottawa Wildflower Seed Library has some great videos.

Since December 20, Laura has been filling the Community Seed Exchange table with native plant seeds that were harvested in the fall from the Library Commons Garden as well as from other gardens in Peterborough.

If you have seeds you'd like to share, feel free to drop them off at the exchange table and take some new ones. If you don't have any native plant seeds to share, take some anyway and try your hand at winter sowing. Quantities are limited for some species. It's ideal to research the plants first for their adaptability to your garden environment. But please feel free to ask questions on this site. If you're only into annuals (e.g. vegetables, etc.), this is ok too and you can take and give those kinds of seeds later next year.

Here's a list of the <u>available native plant seeds</u> the library is distributing.

# Name: Etobicoke Master Gardeners Landscape Technician Scholarship of Excellence

**Details:** This scholarship launches this winter in partnership with Humber College, Faculty of Applied Science and Technology and will be awarded to the student achieving the highest score in Plant Studies 1. Or, if more than one student qualifies, to the one who also has the highest overall GPA in their first term. The value of the scholarship is \$1000 and will be awarded annually over the next five years.

# Name: Worms About Town, Reinke Lab @ UToronto

**Details:** In April 2024 the Etobicoke Master Gardeners were introduced to this citizen-science initiative by Ed James (post doctoral fellow) and Jonathan Tersigni (graduate student) from the Reinke Lab at the University of Toronto.

This is the first Toronto-wide screen of microsporidia infection in nematodes and is intended to lead to a better understanding of nematodes in Toronto, the identification of new fungi species, and how species of fungi can infect other species of animals. Several EMG members participated in the late summer and early fall by collecting samples of well-rotted fruit. We look forward to continued participation and to learning more about the presence and health of nematodes in our area.

Todd has over 25 years of experience working with trees and educating people about their care. On the walk he shared with 40 participants the fascinating aspects of trees, including universal principles, general tree health, tips on how to assess their trees, and what to do to ensure their trees flourish.

# Name: Purple Loosestrife (*Lythrum salicaria*) Control

**Details:** In the summer of 2024, MG Judy Wall and Lanark County Master Gardeners started working with the team at Lanark County Municipal Office. We had been getting many questions about the resurgence of Purple Loosestrife. Our contact at the Municipal Office asked that we spread the word that she would like to receive emails identifying the problem and where it was located.

Judy travelled to Hort Societies to talk about it and requested that we spread the word at advice clinics. We did, and we convinced the County to act. Our contact has put in a grant request for funding to have another release of the beetles that control Purple Loosestrife.

Lanark County Master Gardeners provided locations in the area that now again have substantial growth of Purple Loosestrife. We are very much looking forward to a successful outcome of this project.

She has also created a reel with step-by-step instructions on how to winter sow that can be found on our Grand Erie Master Gardener Facebook and Instagram pages.


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# **Toronto Master Gardeners**


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
# **Niagara Master Gardeners**

She gave a run down of just a few of the many plants, and mushrooms as well, that can help cure what ails us or improve our general wellbeing. Images below from her slide show offer just a sampling of the many plants she spoke about.

Witch hazel (Hamamelis virginiana) is a botanical astringent. Astringents shrink or tighten tissues in your body and used topically can relieve itching, burning and irritation. Leaves of Raspberry (Rubus idaeus) are highly nutritive and rich in antioxidants, and are used in traditional herbal medicine for the female reproductive system to relieve PMS and to help prepare women for childbirth by increasing blood flow to the uterus.



Astragalus (Astragalus membranaceus) is used in traditional Chinese medicine to treat decreased vitality/fatigue and as a deep immune tonic. It is used in herbal medicine for nausea associated with chemo and cancer-related fatigue.



Peppermint is used in herbal medicine to treat indigestion, IBS, flatulence and as a decongestant for colds/flu. Peppermint oil is used topically for headache, muscle aches and joint pain. Lavender is good topically and internally. Studies have shown lavender essential oil may be beneficial for insomnia, alopecia (hair loss), anxiety, stress, and postoperative pain. Lavender is also being studied for antibacterial and antiviral properties.



Arnica (Arnica montana) is used topically for a wide range of conditions, including bruises, sprains, muscle aches, wound healing, superficial phlebitis, joint pain, inflammation from insect bites, and swelling from broken bones. Recent studies say it may be helpful in the treatment of burns.





# Oak Wilt Disease

Reminder – Do Not Prune oak trees (*Quercus* spp.) from April until December: winter pruning when the tree is dormant needs to be the new norm.

Calling everyone who deals with oak trees including nurseries, garden centers, homeowners, [Master



The pathogen that causes oak wilt (*Bretziella fagacearum*) is now present in the Ontario environment; prevention is key to defend against oak wilt. All ages and sizes of oak trees are susceptible to oak wilt.

Oak Wilt (*Bretziella fagacearum*) is a fungal disease that can kill oak trees within one year. Red oaks are particularly susceptible.

The Ontario government advises 'you should not prune or wound oaks between April 1 and November 30, when the sap beetles that spread the disease are active'.

This disease can cause serious damage to Canada's oak tree population. Pathways by which oak wilt can spread include:

- root grafting, where the fungus travels through the interconnected roots of infected and healthy trees growing in close proximity;
- insects, such as sap and bark beetles that carry spores
  of the fungus from an infected tree to a healthy one;
  and
- human-assisted spread through the movement of things such as firewood and pruning during high-risk periods.

#### **CFIA Seeds Alert**

Canadians are urged to connect with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) before sending seeds abroad.

As Canada's plant health regulator, the CFIA plays an important role in making sure seeds from Canada meet internationally agreed upon regulations. There have been notifications of non-compliance from foreign countries about seeds exported from Canada without proper phytosanitary (plant health) certification.

Seeds can potentially be invasive in some countries or spread plant diseases or other pests. Not meeting requirements has consequences such as the destination country destroying the seeds and issuing Canada a notice of non-compliance. All seeds, including those in small packets for gardeners, must comply with the import requirements of the destination country.

Please share this information with the Canadian public to increase awareness of the important steps to take when shipping or exporting seeds to protect international plant resources, our economy and the environment.

The CFIA has spokespeople available for interviews, people who are experts in plant health imports and exports. CFIA experts are also willing to write and submit a piece if that is of interest. Please contact us if you have any questions. We look forward to hearing from you.
