Kay joined 1000 Islands MGs in January, 2025. Kay says, "How one develops as a gardener involves both luck and choice. I was riding ponies before I started school, and by

the time I sold my last horse 50 years later, I'd spent tens of thousands of hours training on roads and trails in wild green places from Nova Scotia to Alberta. There's nothing I'd rather do.

So not surprisingly, nothing is more exquisite and instructive to my eye than the natural or naturalized world, and how and where, and with whom, plants choose to grow. Today, I'm a re-wilder, an un-gardener, pulling out the undesirables, letting the good stuff fill in. But then there are the invasives. Once you know them and see them, you can't unsee them. They're everywhere, starving songbirds and choking out the native plants that feed native species. Why is the horticultural trade allowed to freely sell invasive plants without warning tags so people know what they're buying? We're behind the States in this respect.

I've only just started as a MGiT, and I look forward to gaining more knowledge in areas where I have less experience, such as growing vegetables, and putting my skills as a journalist and editor to use producing some articles, or possibly even presentations for schools, or whatever else my MG friends might need help with." – Kay

Name: Seedy Sunday

Details: The Local Community Food Centre, Stratford ("The Local") was the venue on February 23rd for Seedy Sunday. The Tri-County Master Gardeners were there, offering advice, information about winter sowing, and information about their upcoming Native Perennial and Shrub Sale.

It was a wonderful morning with speakers, crafts people, seed sellers, and the local library and other organizations having booths.

Name: Winter Sowing of Native Seeds Workshop

Details: On a cold January morning, Tri-County Master Gardeners' member Michele Young led a 'Winter Sowing of Native Seeds' Workshop in Goderich, Huron County. In total, 24 participants completed planting 48 containers of a variety of native seeds.

On May 24th these participants will return with one of their germinated containers to learn how to separate and "pot up" the seedlings. (These participants are able to keep one of their containers to finish up at home and possibly share plants with their neighbours.) Many of the newly potted-up seedlings will be destined to be transplanted to sensitive areas that have had common buckthorn (*Rhamnus cathartica*) removal completed, while other plants will be sold to the general public in a plant sale that will support the ongoing invasive species removal efforts.

Michele says, "It is such an honour to be able to serve our community with educational opportunities AND to ensure that more native plants find their forever homes in our own neighbourhoods."


Lanark County Master Gardeners

Oak Wilt Disease

Reminder – Do Not Prune Oak Trees (Quercus spp.) from April 1st until December: winter pruning when the tree is dormant needs to be the new norm.



Calling everyone who deals with oak trees including nurseries, garden centers, homeowners, [Master

Gardeners], and tree professionals! This is a friendly reminder to hold off pruning your oaks from now until the end of November to protect trees from oak wilt disease.

The pathogen that causes oak wilt (*Bretziella fagacearum*) is present in the Ontario environment, and prevention is key to defend against oak wilt. All ages and sizes of oak trees are susceptible to oak wilt.

Oak Wilt (*Bretziella fagacearum*) is a fungal disease that can kill oak trees within one year. Red oaks are particularly susceptible. The Ontario government advises 'you should not prune or wound oaks between April 1 and November 30, when the sap beetles that spread the disease are active'. https://www.ontario.ca/page/oak-wilt#:~:text=Oak%20wilt%20is%20an%20introduced,Falls%20area%20of%20Southern%20Ontario.

This disease can cause serious damage to Canada's oak tree population. Pathways by which oak wilt can spread include:

- root grafting, where the fungus travels through the interconnected roots of infected and healthy trees growing in close proximity;
- insects, such as sap and bark beetles that carry spores of the fungus from an infected tree to a healthy one; and
- human-assisted spread through the movement of things such as firewood and pruning during high-risk periods.

CFIA Seeds Alert

Canadians are urged to connect with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) before sending seeds abroad.

As Canada's plant health regulator, the CFIA plays an important role in making sure seeds from Canada meet internationally agreed upon regulations. There have been notifications of non-compliance from foreign countries about seeds exported from Canada without proper phytosanitary (plant health) certification.

Seeds can potentially be invasive in some countries or spread plant diseases or other pests. Not meeting requirements has consequences such as the destination country destroying the seeds and issuing Canada a notice of non-compliance. All seeds, including those in small packets for gardeners, must comply with the import requirements of the destination country.

Please share this information with the Canadian public to increase awareness of the important steps to take when shipping or exporting seeds to protect international plant resources, our economy and the environment.

The CFIA has spokespeople available for interviews, people who are experts in plant health imports and exports. CFIA experts are also willing to write and submit a piece if that is of interest. Please contact us if you have any questions. We look forward to hearing from you.
