### Milestone—Community Recognition Award

On Tuesday, October 28<sup>th</sup> the Stratford City Council presented its Community Recognition Awards at the Stratford Rotary Complex Community Hall. The award for a Community Leader was given to Tri-County Master Gardener Don Farwell, in recognition of his *Contributions in Gardening and Environmental Projects*.

Don's accomplishments in this category are far too many to list here, but they include: leading pollinator gardening educational sessions for children and youth; working on ReLeaf Stratford, a project to plant at least 2,022 native trees and shrubs in Stratford in 2022, the Year of the Garden, a goal which was exceeded; spearheading the replanting of the garden in front of Stratford General Hospital's emergency department with native plants; and coming up with an initiative to donate native trees, shrubs and perennials to assisted living and long term care homes in Huron, Oxford and Perth Counties to give senior residents access to nature.

Name: Toronto Master Gardeners Technical Update Details: Toronto Master Gardeners hosted their first inperson Technical Update in 5 years. It was a lively event! Master Gardeners came from 19 different groups across Ontario to participate. We very much appreciate your support for our event.

Our focus was to provide support for advice we give to home gardeners, including how to navigate unfriendly municipal bylaws, researching science-based information on the internet, wildscaping garden design, boulevard gardens, front yard food gardens, growing native plants from seed, and plant ID apps. But best of all was the opportunity to meet or re-acquaint ourselves, post-Covid, with our MG colleagues.

Participants were provided with copies of some presentations, and with ecological gardening resources available to home gardeners, to successfully negotiate with neighbours and bylaw enforcement officers. We aligned the main body of our strategic planning meeting to that of MGOIs, using the SWOT Analysis (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities & Threats) methodology where each coordinator discussed the successes, challenges and next steps of their respective committees. Overall, we agreed that our objectives for the past year were met, especially in the areas of education, online accessibility, and in various forms of community engagement (Gardener in Residence programs, winter seminar series, Seedy Saturdays, farmers' markets, annual plant sale, etc.).

Like other rural counties, we experience many of the same challenges and threats:

- 1) our geographical area and winter weather limit inperson gatherings;
- 2) there's difficulty attracting and/or keeping new members:
- 3) core memberships are aging with increasing physical limitations; and
- 4) member burnout is real!

Our underlying reason for becoming involved is, of course, our shared passion for gardening! Working together as a group is many things.....communicating, exploring, learning, sharing, sometimes challenging, and always evolving!

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### **Lanark County Master Gardeners**

Name: Blakeney Garden Project

**Details:** For the past four years, Lanark County Master Gardeners have worked with the Lanark County Food Bank (Hunger Stop) to grow food for the Food Bank. MG David Hinks is the project manager and MG Gerda Franssen is his right hand (wo)man. They work with a team of volunteers to plant, tend and harvest vegetables for the foodbank. Gerda and David and other experienced volunteers work five days a week to care for the gardens. This year, the Blakeney Garden produced 11,559 pounds of food for the Food Bank—Hunger Stop. Well done team!

Name: Hope and Action Festival

**Details:** On October 24–25, the London Middlesex Master Gardeners (LMMGs) participated in the *Hope and Action Festival* at Fanshawe Conservation Area, hosted by the Upper Thames River Conservation Authority.

- Friday, October 24: Special Programming welcomed Grade 7 and 8 students from London for hands-on environmental learning. ### **CFIA Seeds Alert**

Canadians are urged to connect with the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) before sending seeds abroad.

As Canada's plant health regulator, the CFIA plays an important role in making sure seeds from Canada meet internationally agreed upon regulations. There have been notifications of non-compliance from foreign countries about seeds exported from Canada without proper phytosanitary (plant health) certification.

Seeds can potentially be invasive in some countries or spread plant diseases or other pests. Not meeting requirements has consequences such as the destination country destroying the seeds and issuing Canada a notice of non-compliance. All seeds, including those in small packets for gardeners, must comply with the import requirements of the destination country.

Please share this information with the Canadian public to increase awareness of the important steps to take when shipping or exporting seeds to protect international plant resources, our economy and the environment.

The CFIA has spokespeople available for interviews, people who are experts in plant health imports and exports. CFIA experts are also willing to write and submit a piece if that is of interest.
