Name: Blueberry Fields Community Gardens 10th Anniversary

Details: On June 20th, Blueberry Fields Community Gardens hosted a community picnic celebrating their 10th Anniversary of producing organic vegetables and herbs for donations to the Kerr Street Mission food bank in Oakville. Blueberry Fields have 20 raised beds (approximately 2,000 sq ft), located behind the Upper Oakville Shopping Centre, that fully support the garden plots.

A core group of volunteers plan, manage and organize all agricultural activities, from planning vegetable plant layouts and starting seedlings to organizing community volunteers. The garden uses only composted manure as fertilizer and utilizes natural methods for pest and weed control.

It all started with Ken Stockstill, Superintendent of Upper Oakville Shopping Centre, 10 years ago. With many years of landscaping and horticultural experience, Ken convinced the owner of the shopping center to convert the open green space into a collective community garden. He would coordinate community volunteers to sow, weed and harvest, and donate 100% of the produce to a local food bank. In July 2023, Ken's sudden passing prompted a core group of volunteers to step up to continue his dream of giving back to the community.

In the 2025 growing season, Blueberry Fields donated their highest harvest on record, totalling 1,646 lbs. of fresh produce solely based on 900 volunteer hours worked. All work in the garden is done by volunteers of all ages, including children, teens, adults, seniors and corporate groups.

At the 10th Anniversary celebration, our Halton MG and volunteer Judith Desembrana conducted guided garden tours of the various organic vegetables and herbs grown from seed (i.e., potatoes, carrots, beans, lettuce, etc.).

This event raised the profile of the community garden, made people aware of the many Oakville families suffering food insecurity, and in addition encouraged people to grow their own vegetables. We are hopeful the 2026 growing season will provide a harvest exceeding 1,600 lbs. of produce.
